 - M. Costello and K. Prunier volunteered to be representatives from the Board at the Stake Holder's meeting for our strategic plan on July 12.
 - L. Puchalski made the motion, seconded by K. Prunier to approve a total of \$850, \$510 to be
 deducted from the Programming line from the Town Budget, the remaining \$340 to be deducted
 from the State Aid account, to support upcoming Adult programming. Unanimously approved.
 - Discussion followed regarding funding for extraneous requests and for future events to be brought before the Board in the fall by Adult Services Librarian S. Nakanishi.
 - Youth Services Librarian M. McCabe presented her plans for upcoming programs and action plan strategies for the Ryan Reardon Reading Room.
 - K. Prunier made the motion, seconded by J. Koulouras to approve a total of \$913.27, \$510 to be
 deducted from the Programming line from the Town Budget, the remaining \$403.27 to be deducted
 from the State Aid account, to support upcoming youth programming. Unanimously approved.

Community Preservation Updates

Lauren and I are signed up for several webinar trainings through the Northeast Document Conservation Center. All full timers and assistants will also receive a basic training in handling our rare documents collection and what the process should be once the collection is available for patron use.

Children's Room

Meghan and I met with Sean Mahoney and Norma Reardon to discuss potential changes to the children's room that are realistic and serve all children. Meghan has written up tentative plans that we have discussed and they are attached to this report. Meghan requests permission to take down two bulletin boards, which is mentioned in her write-up.

Friends Group

I had a successful informational meeting with potential Friends members last month, and I will be having a follow-up informational meeting this **Saturday**, **June 16th at 10:30am**. If any Trustee is interested in being a liason, please let me know. Additionally, once the group is legally established, I will make sure they have a liason to come to Trustee meetings.

State Aid Program

I attended an ARIS workshop on June 4th at the Salisbury Public Library. Liz Babbitt from the MBLC discussed updates to the ARIS. Throughout this fiscal year I have been keeping close track of statistics that we will need for the ARIS, so I believe that completing it will not be a complicated process.

Strategic Planning

Susan Babb and I have planned a community stakeholders meeting for Thursday, July 12th at 6:30pm. I need one or two trustees to volunteer to attend this meeting as stakeholders. I am also inviting representatives from groups in Groveland for a group of people totaled up to around twelve or thirteen people. In the meantime, I have distributed surveys called S.O.A.R. (Strengths, Opportunities, Aspirations, Results) to the staff to fill out about the Library as part of the strategic planning process. Meghan has also started to distribute a youth services survey, which will help in developing the larger survey for strategic planning.

BookExpo 2018

Sue and I attended BookExpo in New York City 5/31-6/1. As this was my second year attending, I knew what to expect from the conference and was able to offer Sue advice as she made up her own schedule of presentations she wanted to attend. Her own take on BookExpo is attached.

This year, I was able to make connections with several book reviewers and librarians over the course of the two days we attended. Because a large part of BookExpo is networking, we all shared review websites that we know of as well as new ways of finding items that may circulate well at our libraries. I picked up a large amount of advanced reader copies of books, which I gave to Meghan to review and possibly purchase in the new fiscal year if she chooses. This way she can preview books before purchasing them, or make early recommendations to children and their parents about books that are being released. BookExpo is also a way of learning about new products, like toys and games that would do well in libraries. For example, last year Chronicle Books attended BookExpo as an exhibitor. I had never heard of them, but in addition to publishing books they publish games that libraries can purchase for their patrons to play. This year, Chronicle Books attended again and had a new catalog full of interesting items that they have coming out for purchase!

Overall, BookExpo is always a worthwhile experience full of opportunities to connect with other librarians, book reviewers, and booksellers.


















Children's Room Renovation Proposal:

The community of Groveland generously donated funds in honor of Ryan Reardon to help start renovations in the Children's Room. Our goal is to not only honor Ryan, but to honor all of the youth that will use this space.

The Children's Room is shared by a variety of age groups. It is important that we create a space that feels welcoming to all. This space is to be appropriate for a library setting but also reflect the wants and needs of the community. To reach this goal we have created a survey for patrons to complete so that we may take their feedback and implement it in a strategic and practical way.

Below is a list, in order, of how we aim to renovate the room with the funds that have been given to us. Steps one through five will be our main focus. Steps six and seven will be a part of our long term plan.

1. Weeding

a. Going through the collection will allow us to declutter the space and make room for newer books. Weeding will help the space to look less cluttered and allow us to place shelving in a way that will be more orderly and welcoming to our patrons.

2. Painting

A fresh coat of white paint will be the best fit for the room. It will be a neutral background for potential bulletin board displays and decorations that will be put up throughout the year. To aid in painting, we would like to ask permission to potentially have two of the bulletin boards removed in the Children's Room: one in the back left corner and one near the back right corner. A potential idea for these spaces is to add

more shelving. The last part of painting will be a dark purple or dark blue trim around the doors.

3. Shelving

Once the collection is weeded we would then like to transition over to mobile shelving. This would allow us to transform the space when needed.

4. Carpeting

Carpeting in the Children's Room goes through daily wear and tear. We would like to use square carpet tiles. This will allow for easy clean up and replacement if needed. (color scheme: green, blue, white, grey, purple)

5. Furniture

Since we have limited space, we have to be very discerning on what we put into the room. While the furniture and items can be engaging and educational, they must also be functional and have multipurpose. We aim to keep the table and chairs in the room, but would like to replace the bulky blue chairs with lightweight and easy to clean bean bag chairs.


