GREETINGS:

In the name of the Commonwealth you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town who are qualified to vote in the Annual Town Meeting to meet at the Dr. Elmer S. Bagnall School, on Monday, April 24th, 2000 @ 7:30 P.M. to vote on the following Articles:

Meeting was called to order at 7:46 P.M. when quorum was declared by moderator Maya Ollson. General procedures were gone over. Pledge of Allegience was done. Town Clerk, Richard T. Sciacca, read the greeting and the meeting was started.

ARTICLE 1: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer to enter into compensating balance agreements during Fiscal Year 2001, as permitted by Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 53F; or take any other action relative thereto.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN RECOMMEND FAVORABLE ACTION

FINANCE BOARD RECOMMENDS FAVORABLE ACTION

ACTION TAKEN: MOTION MOVED AND SECONDED FOR FAVORABLE ACTION. NO DISCUSSION. VOTED UNANIMOUS FAVORABLE ACTION.

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to delete in its entirety the following General Bylaw, "Sec. 2-21. Notice. Every Town Meeting shall be notified by posting copies of the Warrant calling the same, in not less than three (3) public places in the town, fourteen (14) days at least before the day appointed for said meeting; one (1) of said copies to be posted in that part of the town known as "Savaryville", one (1) in that part of the town known as the "Village", and one (1) in that part of the town known as "South Groveland" and replace it with the following:

"Sec. 2-21. Notice. Every Town Meeting shall be notified by posting copies of the Warrant calling the same, in not less than three (3) public places in the town, seven (7) days at least before the Annual Town Meeting, and fourteen (14) days at least before a Special Town Meeting; one (1) of said copies to be posted in that part of the town known as "Savaryville", one (1) in that part of the town known as the "Village", and one (1) in that part of the town known as "South Groveland"; or take an other action relative thereto.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN RECOMMEND Motion to table and seconded . Voted to Table FINANCE BOARD RECOMMENDS ACTION TAKEN: TABLED

ARTICLE 10: To see if the town will vote to amend General Bylaws Section 2-24. "Quorums", by deleting in their entirety paragraphs (a) and (b) which read as follows:

- "(a) Annual Town Meeting. A quorum at an Annual Town Meeting shall consist of not less than one hundred (100) of the legal voters of the town.
- (b) Special Town Meeting for appropriations. A quorum at a Special Town Meeting shall consist of not less than fifteen (15) of the legal voters of the town to vote on any Article for transfer or appropriation of funds not exceeding Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, and a quorum of not less than one hundred (100) of the legal voters of the town is required to vote on any Article for transfer or appropriation of funds exceeding Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars."

"A quorum at any Annual or Special Town Meeting shall consist of not less than one hundred (100) legal voters of the town."
or take any other action relative thereto.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN RECOMMEND FAVORABLE ACTION

and adding the following paragraph in their place:

FINANCE BOARD RECOMMENDS

ACTION TAKEN: Moved and seconded for favorable action. Voted favorable action.

THE THIRD SESSION OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WAS CALLED TO ORDER BY THE MODERATOR, MAYA OLLSON, WHEN A LEGAL OUAORUM OF VOTERS WERE CERTIFIED.

WITH THE DEATH OF BOARD OF ASSESSOR MEMBER R. BURKE BEVALAQUA, (ALSO A MEMBER OF THE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPT, FORMER FINANCE BOARD MEMBER, AS WELL AS ACTIVE TOWN CITIZEN IN MANY TOWN ACTIVITIES) A MOMENT OF SILENCE WAS HELD.

Remarks were made to the citizens by chairman of the board of selectmen, Kathleen Kastrinelis. Kastrinelis stated the following points: Using a pink handout, enclosed)

- 1. Due to the failure of overrides totaling \$238,000 Selectmen must make recommendations to bring the Annual Town Budgets into balance.
- 2. Selectmen reviewed all budgets and met with Finance Committee, department heads and Finance Director to arrive at their recommendations.
- 3. Selectmen will make recommendations to maintain essential town services and to plan ahead for the next five years.
- 4. Recommendations:
 - Budgets previously voted:
 - Reconsider Article 12: Town Omnibus and seek reduction to line 23 "rubbish Contract Expense" of \$157,000 and increase line item 24 "Water Expenses by \$25,000 to reimburse Town Health Insurance.
 - Reconsider Article 19: Pentucket Supplemental Budget and recommend "favorable action" with no override.
 - Articles 13 thru 43 not yet voted: Recommend "favorable action" on only those
 articles necessary to maintain the current level of town services. Recommend
 "unfavorable action" on all articles for new debt, additional hours and/or new
 services.
 - Conclusion: If town meeting follows the Selectmen recommendations the budget
 will be balanced. An override vote is scheduled for June 21, 200. At that time the
 voters of the town will be given one last opportunity to fully fund the rubbish
 contract. If the override passes then the Fall Town Meeting will vote the additional
 funds into the rubbish contract. If the override fails then the rubbish pickup will be
 discontinued at some point during the Fiscal 2001.

In making these recommendations to the voters the Selectmen stated the following procedures which they based their decision on. (Handout of a purple sheet, which shall be enclosed as part of the official record).

As you know the Fiscal Town Budget became out of balance when the two override questions for \$187,000.00 and \$51,000.00 failed. The Selectmen conducted numerous meetings to determine the best recommendation to balance the budget. Actions taken by the board to resolve this problem include:

- Coordinating with the Superintendent of Schools and various school committee
 members to determine if the Pentucket assessment could be further reduced.
- 2. Meeting with department heads and Finance Committee to discuss the impact on town services of reductions to their budgets.
- Work session of the Board of Selectmen with the town Finance Director to review the financial forecast and determine responsible options to balance the town budget.

The Selectmen identified three key objectives:

- 1.) Maintain essential town services and ensure that any reduction to town budgets are fair-i.e. they do not target one segment of the town population.
- 2.) Plan ahead for the next five years so that actions taken this year's town meeting have a positive impact on next year's finances.
- 3.) Present one recommendation to town meeting and strive to win town meeting support.

Based on these actions and objectives the Selectmen recommend as follows:

- 1. For articles previously voted and approved at the first session of the Annual Town Meeting
 - Selectmen will make the motion to reconsider Article 12: The Town Omnibus and seek a reduction to line 23 "Rubbish Contract Expenses" of \$157,000.00 and increase line 24 "Water Expenses" by \$25,000.00 to reimburse the Town for health insurance costs.
 - School Committee will make a motion to reconsider Article 19: the Pentucket Supplemental Budget and Selectmen will recommend "favorable action" on the article with no override.
- 2. For articles not yet voted by the Town Meeting Selectmen will recommend as follows:
 - Article 13: 4% Raise for non-contractual Employees: Favorable action since the prior town meeting has already approved similar increases for all contractual employees.
 - Articles 14 & 15: Unfavorable action since these articles increase hours beyond the current level of town services.
 These two articles will be forwarded to the Personnel Board for review at next year's annual toen meeting.
 - Article 16: Favorable action since it sets the salaries previously voted.
 - Article 17, 18, & 20: Favorable action for school assessments.
 - Article 21 & 22: No action needed. Article 21 may be tabled and Article 22 was voted favorable action at the first session of town meeting and override passes.
 - Article 23 & 24: Favorable action. The first article is a mandatory payment and the second article maintains current town services.
 - Article 25 & 26: Unfavorable action. Both articles are new to the town budget and will be further evaluated for the next year's annual town meeting.

- Article 27: Unfavorable action. The Board of Selectmen
 will recommend that the entire proceeds from the sale of
 town owned land in Article 35 (equal to \$50,000.00) be
 placed in the Conservation fund and this money can be
 used or land appraisals and acquisitions.
- Article 28 & 29: Unfavorable action. The Board of Selectmen recommends that both articles be reviewed by the Capital Planning Committee to ensure that the money is set aside in the town budget to make the future bond payments.
- Article 30: Unfavorable action: This is an addition to current town services. Selectmen will recommend that this be reviewed and recommended on by the Personnel Board for next year's meeting.
- Article 31: Unfavorable action. There is funding still available from the Fiscal 2000 budget that can be carried over to Fiscal 2001.
- Article 32 & 33: Favorable action since these articles add to town budget.
- Article 34: Favorable action. No direct impact on town budget.
- Article 35: Favorable action. Selectmen recommend that the funds from this sale be placed in the Conservation fund for use on future open space appraisals and acquisition.
- Article 36: Favorable action. No impact on town budget.
- Article 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, and 42: Favorable action.
 These articles use only those revenues that are available in the revolving funds and so they do not impact the towns operating budget.
- Article 43: Table. This are no longer valid.
- Conclusion: If the town meting follows these recommendations then the budget will be balanced. The Selectmen have scheduled an override election for June 21, 2000. The question on the ballot asks voters to increase the town budget by &157,000.00 to fully fund the trash contract. If the ballot questions passes then the Selectmen will place an article on the Fall own Meeting to fully fund the trash contract. If the ballot question fails thenthe Selectmen will re-negotiate the rubbish contract to continue services for as long as possible in Fiscal 2001. Residents will receive notification of how long the town will be able to provide curbside pickup and will be given information on how to arrange to rubbish disposal after curbside pickup ends. The Selectmen chose to reduce rubbish collection services over other town services because they believe:
- This is a service that the homweowners can provide on their own if the override3 fails.
- 2. It is a fair reduction because it impacts all residents of the town equally.
- 3. The rubbish contract over the last ten years continuses to increase more than 2 ½% each year and the

Selectmen's long term plan is to consider providing a "pay as you throw" trash program that is not funded by the town operating budget. This program has not yet been fully evaluated and so cannot be offered to the town in Fiscal 2001.

Finance Committee member John Soucy spoke for the board: He stated that what was voted at the first town meeting session was a balanced budget. At the second session held no action took place. Thus, if all other articles left on the warrant are voted in the unfavorable action mode (except for the schools (which will be underfunded if not voted for as to heir supplemental budget request.

Motion was made to reconsider Article 12 Ominibus article by Kastrinelis and seconded by Sheehan.

Under discussion:

- 1. A question was raised by Debra Webster. "If Article
 19 was voted on (School Supplemental Budget" why
 do we need to open the Omnibus Article?
- Kastrinelis response was, "If Article 19 was voted and if the people will follow the selectmen's advice, then the Omnibus budget has to be open to cut the rubbish contract."
- Ann Howland, finance board Chair stated the the Finance Board is not in favor of opening the Omnibus budget". Nor are they in favor of reconsidering the school supplemental budget article.
- 4. Gordon Blaquiere stated that article 19 should be dealt with first.
- Point of order was raised by School Board member, Carol Grazio. "Can you re-consider an issue again? Town Counsel sated only once."
- 6. Clark Jenkins stated that the town asked for direction from the selectmen and they can with directions for the townspeople to follow.

Voted 2/3 majority to re-consider the Omnibus

Omnibus Budget having been opened the following action took place:

- 1. Article 23, 24, and 25 had hold place on them.
- Article 23 was first taken up with the following debate:
- Kastrinelis made a motion to reduce the rubbish contract by the sum of \$157,000.00.
- Point of order was raised. "Years ago an override was passed for rubbish. Can it be cut?" No response was given
- John Soucy, finance member asked how digd you come up with 157,000 dollars. And why did

- you pick trash as the solution to the budget solution problem?
- Tom Moses, Finance direction stated that the contract was well up over 13%.
- Selectman Sheehan stated that it was not responsible for Groveland to cut Schools since if we choose to do this it effect two other towns.
 West Newbury, and Merrimac children and citizens. Rubbish cuts will effect only Groveland People.
- Darrel Rowe stated that when the budget comes to a crunch trash is always cut. He went on to state that under the regional agreement passed. The School Board had a budget. It also was to get action on a supplemental budget. Let the School board go back and look at the budget."
- Question was asked if we go out for rubbish contract bids, answer yes.
- Kastrinellis responded that rubbish is not always
 the item to take the hit when the budget is out of
 balanced. She state that if the School Board
 supplemental budget is voted unfavorable the
 school board will not reduce their budget
 enough to balance the entire budget.
- Motion was made and seonded to reduce the rubbish contract line from \$330,655.00 to \$173,655.
- Under discussion:
- Doreen Blades: Because of the cost of living increases should not the town be looking at 2 ½ overrides?
- Tom Moses stated that the costs are going up more then 2 1/2. That is the problem.
- John Soucy response Blades: Yes revenues are limited to 2 ½, however the Town

 Meeting votes on all spending article. Thus they can control expenditures.

Motion was moved and seconded to end discussion: Voted favorable to cut said amount from rubbish.

Motion made to increase Water Expenses from \$165,962.00 to \$187,212 No discussion took place. Voted Favorably by 2/3 majority.

Motion made and seconded to amend line item 25 from \$44,011 to \$47,761.00 No discussion to place. Voted favorable by 2/3 vote.

Motion to close and seconded Ominibus budget. Voted favorable to do so.

ARTICLE 12: To raise the following sums to defray Town charges for the ensuing year ending June 30, 2001 and make appropriations therefor, or take any other action relative thereto:
